Keeping Up With Rationing

(Vernonia war price and rationing board (No. 85.6.2) located in bank bldg, Hours 10:00-12:00 and 1:00-3:00 including Saturdays.)

SHOES

February 9 to June 15—Stamp No. 17, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes through this period. Family stamps are interchangeable.

June 16—Stamp No. 18, book one, valid for one pair of shoes.

RATION BOOK THREE

Application blanks have been mailed. Must be returned by mail between June 1 and 10.

RATION BOOK TWO

June 6—Red stamps L valid; M June 13; N, June 20. All, including J and K, expire June 30. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

June 7—Blue stamps G, H and J valid through this date. Blue stamps K, L and M, which became valid May 24, are good through July 7.

SUGAR

Stamp No. 13 good for 5 pounds June 1-August 15.

Stamps No. 15 and No. 16 in book one valid for 5 pounds of sugar each for home canning.

COFFEE

Stamp No. 24 valid May 31 through June 30 for 1 pound.

GASOLINE

July 21—A book expires. No. 6 stamps in A books valid through this date.

TIRES

Cars with B books must have tires inspected every 4 months; cars with C books, every 3 months; cars with A books, every 6 months.

FUEL OIL

September 30—No. 5 coupons expire. Heating coupons—one unit, value ten gallons; ten units, 100 gallons.
