

1944 Stickers May Now Be Used

Windshield stickers validating the 1944 registration of motor vehicles in Oregon now may be used, Secretary of State Bob Farrell said this week. The stickers are valid after December 15.

When the new 1944 stickers are attached to windshields, the old 1943 stickers must be removed, Farrell said. No stickers, except authorized ones, may be displayed on windshields in this state and the 1943 sticker will not be authorized after the new one is in place. The owner whose car wasn't registered in this state in 1943, and who has been operating in this state under reciprocal agreements with adjoining states, must now take out an Oregon registration. He will receive, in addition to the sticker, a sea of 1942 license plates. Titles of these cars also must be transferred from the state of registration in 1943 to Oregon.
