Vernonia war price and rationing board (No. 85.6.2) located in bank bldg. Hours 9:30-12:00 and 1:00-4:30 daily. Saturday 9:30-12:30. Open Tuesday nights at city hall 6-10 p.m.

RATION BOOK 4

Blue stamps A8 thru V8, valid indefinitely.

Red stamps A8 thru W8 valid indefinitely.

SUGAR: Book 4—Sugar stamps 30, 31, and 32 valid indefinitely, 5 pounds each. For canning only: Sugar stamps 40 valid for 5 pounds. Apply at local OPA board for more.

SHOES: Loose Stamps Invalid Airplane stamp No. 1, in book 3 good for one pair of shoes, indefinitely. Airplane stamp 2 in book 3 valid indefinitely beginning May 1.

GASOLINE: Coupons not valid unless endorsed. A No. 12 valid June 22 through Sept. 21. B3 or C3 may be renewed within but not before 15 days from date on cover.

FUEL OIL
Order now! Period 4-5 coupons valid thru Sept. 30. Should be 6 percent of season's supply still unused.

TIRE INSPECTION
Tire inspection no longer required, but tire inspection records are needed to get special gasoline allotments, tire replacements, etc.

STOVES:
Purchasers must get certificates at ration boards for most new stoves.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL
Order next winter's supply now—help delivery-manpower problems and avoid shortage.

PRICE CONTROL
Refer price inquiries and complaints to the price clerk of your local war price and rationing board.
