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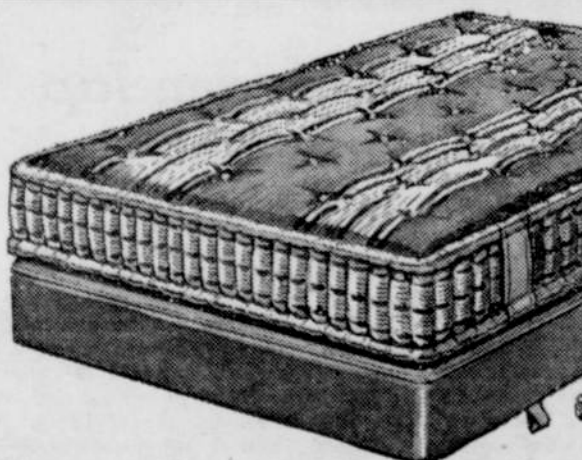

Crop and Feed Loans Available

Loans for the production of war crops as well as normal cash crops and for the production or purchase of feed for livestock continue to be available to farmers through the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Division, Farm Credit Administration, United States Department of Agriculture. Loan funds may be used to buy seed, fertilizer, or other supplies, and to repair farm machinery and equipment and for other necessary and related expenses, according to George Nelson, county agricultural agent, St. Helens.

"Farmers needing credit who are unable to obtain it from production credit associations or on reasonable terms from other lenders may obtain these loans," Mr. Nelson said.

A first lien is required on the crops financed or the livestock fed. The maximum amount which may be loaned to an individual during the calendar year is limited to \$400; however, a borrower who has obtained this maximum amount and has repaid it in whole or in part may reborrow up to this maximum. The interest rate is 4 per cent per annum.

loans may be obtained from S. L. Thompson, field supervisor, 2014 Sandy Blvd., Portland, Ore., Tel. No. East 4962, or from the county agent, George Nelson, located at St. Helens. For the convenience of farmers, Mr. Thompson will be at the county agent's office at St. Helens on Wednesdays from 3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., during February, March, and April to take applications for loans.



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
