Sift flour, measure, and sift again with corn meal, baking powder, soda, sugar, and salt. Beat egg yolks, add milk and combine with dry ingredients, beating until smooth. Add melted butter or margarine and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Drop by tablespoonfuls on moderately hot, lightly greased griddle or heavy frying pan. Turn cakes when bubbles golden brown. Serve with equal amounts of melted butter or margarine and heated syrup. Makes 10 to 12 medium-size cakes.

**DUMPLING QUICKIE**  
2 cups biscuit mix 1 cup milk  
Place mix in bowl; add milk all at once; stir only until all of the flour is dampened. Drop dumplings by tablespoonfuls on gently boiling stew or liquid in large kettle with tight-fitting cover; cover; steam 15 minutes or until done, without removing cover. Makes 12 medium-size dumplings.


