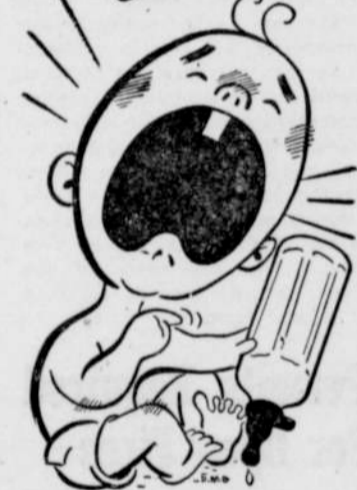
and plans to lead a quiet, restful life here.
