PROCESSED FOODS: Book 4— Blue stamps N2 thru Z2 val thru June 30.

Blue stamps T2 thru X2 valid April 1 thru July 31.

Blue stamps Y2, Z2, A1, B1, and C1 val. May 1 thru Aug. 31.

Blue stamps D1 thru H1 val. thru Sept. 30.

MEAT, BUTTER, FATS AND CHEESES: Book 4—

Red stamps E2 thru J2 val thru June 30.

Red stamps K2 thru P2 valid April 1 thru July 31.

Red stamps Q2, R2, S2, T2, and U2 val. May 1 thru Aug. 31.

Red stamps V2 thru Z2 val. thru Sept. 30.

SUGAR: Book 4—

Sugar stamp 36 val. May 1 thru Aug. 31.

SHOES: Loose stamps invalid. Book 3—Airplane stamps 1-2-3 valid indefinitely.

New shoe stamp val. Aug. 1.

FUEL OIL: Current coupons val. thru August 31, 1945.

GASOLINE: Not valid unless endorsed. A-15 expires June 21st. Each coupon worth 4 gallons.

A-16 val. June 22, 6 gals. ea. B 6-7 val. 5 gal. each, C 6-7 val. 5 gal. each.
