### 945 Lbs. Average Milk Production

The testing work of the Columbia county Cowtesting association has been completed for the second month by the tester, E. P. Ramage, states Geo. A. Nelson secretary of the association. There were 42 herds tested with an enrollment of 660 cows of which 17 were dry.

The average production of milk for the month per cow was 945 and the pounds of butterfat was 37.6.

There is a very definite interest in the cowtesting association work by the dairymen who are interested in keeping records of their cows. Other dairymen have indicated their interest in also

joining the association. There is no better way of building up economical production, according to Mr. Nelson, than by keeping individual records of each cow in the herd and by selecting heifer calves from the high producing cows and eliminating those from the low producing cows.

**How to make a meal with tasty sandwiches**  
By using a filling of meat and/or vegetables between slices of bread a sandwich becomes a well-balanced plate that will satisfy the sharpest appetite. May we suggest by way of a delicious, out-of-the-ordinary dish

- BAKED LUNCHEON SANDWICH**  
8 slices bread 2 tbsps. shortening  
1/2 lb. sliced American 2 tbsps. all-purpose flour  
cheese 1 cup milk  
1 tsp. prepared mustard 1/2 tsp. salt  
2 tbsps. chili sauce  
Toast bread. Place cheese slices on four slices of the toast and spread with mustard. Top with remaining toast and cut in halves lengthwise. Place in well-greased square baking pan (8x8x2). Make white sauce: Melt shortening, blend in flour. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly. Cook until thickened, about 5 minutes. Add salt and chili sauce. Pour over cheese sandwiches. Bake in moderate oven (350° F) 15 minutes. Serve hot.
- SAUTED SUPPER SANDWICH**  
Serve with green salad  
1 cup ground bologna 1/4 cup finely chopped celery  
1 1/2 tbsps. finely 1/4 cup mayonnaise  
chopped onion 1/4 cup dressing  
1 1/2 tbsps. prepared 12 slices bread  
mustard 2 eggs  
1 1/2 tbsps. lemon juice 2 tbsps. milk  
1 hard cooked egg 1/4 tsp. salt  
Mix bologna or luncheon, onion, mustard, lemon juice, chopped egg, celery and mayonnaise or salad dressing together. Spread generously between slices of bread; cut in half diagonally. Dip sandwiches in beaten egg mixed with milk and salt; saute in hot melted shortening or drippings. Serves 6.
