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Heaters May be 'White Elephants'

(Note: The following article has been prepared by the West Oregon Electric cooperative as a public service for users of electricity in order to point out important considerations before installing electric water heaters. Other articles are intended in future issues of The Eagle to point out proper methods of installing electrical fixtures. Proper installation will give Nehalem Valley people complete satisfaction from the abundant power soon to be made available.)

Plenty of hot water, all you want of it, for bathing, washing, laundry and cooking, plenty of hot water 365 days a year, 24 hours a day, is a long-time dream of many members of the West Oregon Electric cooperative.

A well-designed water heater can provide for all the needs of the members of the family. One poorly designed can be an expensive "white elephant," costly to operate and can fail to provide enough hot water for the family. Here are some important points to warn members about when purchasing and installing hot water heaters:

1. Be sure to buy a heater that is big enough. Plenty of storage capacity is needed to provide for wash-day needs or other special occasions. The minimum size recommended is 30 gallons with 10 gallons extra capacity per each additional member of the family over two. Extra size in the tank does not cost much more when the original purchase is made compared with the extra convenience provided. In estimating size remember that a water heater will only deliver about 75 per cent of its capacity before cold water begins to mix in.

2. Be sure that the water tank is well insulated in order to cut down on heat loss.

3. Be sure that your electric hot water tank is installed as close as possible to the place where most of the hot water will be used, again to cut down on heat loss.

4. As another means of cutting down on heat loss, make sure that the hot water pipes are as small as possible. A 3/4 inch or a 1/2 inch copper tubing is recommended, providing it or any other hot water pipe is well insulated.

5. Make sure that the heater has an adequate drainage valve so located that the tank can be completely drained.

6. Make sure that the heater has an adequate safety valve for pressure relief.

7. Make sure that your electric water heater is so installed that the heating elements and all other controls are easy to get to for replacement or adjustment.

8. Your electric hot water heater should be 230 volts, with non-inductive heating elements. The bottom elements should not exceed the size of the upper element. The minimum size of each element should not be less than 1000 watts.

9. All cables to your electric hot water heater should be continuous without splices and the minimum size wire should be No. 10 or larger.

10. Your electric hot water heater should be on a separate circuit and separately fused from all other circuits in your home.
