Hostess to Society

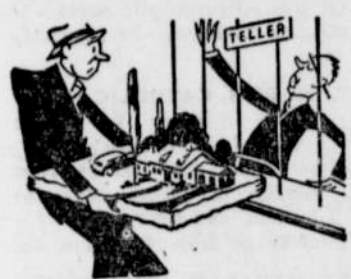
