<p>3. Not all firms are on the "approved" list. Most V.A. offices maintain a list for their area.</p> 	<p>4. When you enter training, give the firm your Certificate of Eligibility to be endorsed and forwarded to V.A.</p> 
<p>5. V.A. will then enroll you to receive a subsistence allowance, tools and supplies.</p> 	<p>6. During training you may receive up to \$65 mo., if without dependents, or \$90 mo., with dependents, plus your wages.</p>
