Boiler Removes Botulism Danger

Botulism poisoning, probably the most dreaded type of food poisoning and which kills from one to three persons a year in Oregon, can be easily and positively eliminated simply by making sure that canned food in which it occurs is boiled 10 minutes before tasting as soon as the can or jar is opened.

This is the warning given by G. V. Copson, head of the bacteriology department at Oregon State college, as this year's canning season starts. While botulism has been reported at least once in almost every food, about 90 per cent of all cases have resulted from canned string beans and asparagus used cold as in a salad, and in canned corn that was warmed but not boiled, he added.

"The real danger of Botulism is that it strikes so seldom that people become careless in preparation of canned food," Copson explained. "Because the deadly bacteria which cause botulism are so abundant in Oregon soil, constant care is needed. Nationally known commercially canned products have never been reported as causing botulism"

It is not safe to depend on odor or off flavor to reveal botulism contamination, the bacteriologist warns. Eating just one string bean that appeared normal caused the death of a woman who sampled a can before cooking the beans for the family, which ate them without injury after they were boiled. Half an olive has also proven fatal.

Following correct, conscientious canning methods is the first step in eliminating death from botulism, and the next is making sure that home canned susceptible foods are boiled 10 minutes as soon as opened and before they are even tasted, he concluded. If leftovers are put away for a few days, it is safest to boil them again.

Circulars Tell Proper DDT Use

Have you been puzzled over which of the scores and scores of DDT concoctions now on the market to buy for garden, household or livestock use?

Then two experiment station circulars of information just issued at Oregon State college will help straighten out the matter.

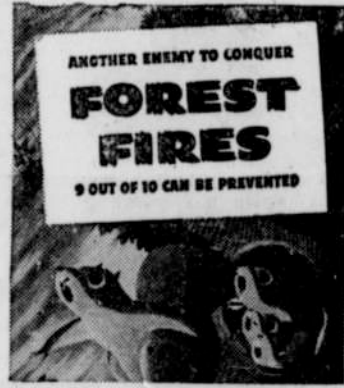
One is "DDT Products and Precautions in Their Use," by R. H. Robinson, agricultural chemist, while the other is "Suggestions on the Use of DDT for Vegetable Garden Pest Control." Both are available by writing the college extension department.

The first of these, after stating that there are now more than 150 different brands of DDT products on the market, explains the different forms and their best uses. DDT products are now sold as wettable powders for sprays, dusts, DDT-in-oil products, and DDT aerosol bombs. All of these have their special uses and some may be used more or less interchangeably while others cannot.

The circular also stresses the fact that DDT is not in the category of deadly poisons such as must be labeled with skull and crossbones, but that simple precautions are necessary.

The other circular lists all the common garden vegetables with their principal pests and tells whether DDT will control them or not. Dusting powder of 3 per cent is the most useful in the garden, states the author, Dr. Don C. Mote, head of the entomology department. Five per cent strength is used for squash bugs and similar plant bugs.

DDT is particularly effective with the 11 spotted cucumber beetles, the circular shows, a pest heretofore resistant to nearly all insecticides. It is also good for most species of thrips, flea beetles, cabbage worms, squash bugs, carrot rust fly, pea weevil and some others. On many other pests experimental evidence is still lacking or inconclusive. Gardeners are cautioned not to use it on edible parts of vegetables.
