

American 'Real Income' In June Off 11 Cents On \$1 From Year Ago

**PURCHASING POWER** JUNE 1945 vs JUNE 1946



THE above chart, showing how the average American fared in national income changes in the last twelve months, is based on the monthly consumers' study of Investors Syndicate of Minneapolis.

The American public in June had a "real income" of 89 cents, or 11 cents on the dollar less than in

cents on the dollar less than in June, 1945. This "real income" is not a subtraction of cash income and expenditures but an average to show how living costs affect adjusted income dollars.

Cash income of the American ublic in June was 93 cents for every \$1 a year earlier. The following changes per dollar were: wages off 14 cents, salaries off 16 cents on the \$1.00; investment income at \$1.10 was up ten cents and other income at \$1.04 was up four cents. Rents in June were unchanged compared with a year ago. Food was up four cents, clothing up eight cents and miscelianeous items up six cents.
