

"4-H CLUBS ACTIVE IN PEACE AS IN WAR"

During the war years, the boys and girls of the 4-H Clubs throughout America formed one of our first lines of defense.

Now that peace has returned to the world, these youthful farmers are performing duties which are equally important. They are helping to keep up the nation's food production at a time when starving people the world over need help and need it badly.

As in past years, the Pacific International Livestock Exposition will work very closely with 4-H Clubs, encouraging them to greater efforts when these efforts are sorely needed. The Pacific Northwest holds an enviable record in number of such clubs. Here in this section of the country there are about 5000 4-H Clubs which boast a membership of some 40,000 active boys and girls.

Pictured above is a typical 4-H Club member, Stanley Brown of Carlton, Oregon. Stanley has participated in club work for some ten years—the maximum period a boy may remain active under existing club rules. The photograph shows him with a champion fat lamb exhibited at the 1937 show and the smile on his face indicates the pride he feels in his accomplishment. Stanley has also received high recognition for his showing of beef cattle.

Stanley's grandfather, Frank Brown, is one of the original organizers of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition. Today he is one of the trustees of the organization. During his more active years, he was a widely known exhibitor of sheep and shorthorn cattle.

Frank Brown, Jr., Stanley's father, is also well known and nationally recognized as an exhibitor of sheep and shorthorn cattle. He has been a judge at International Livestock shows at Chicago and at Toronto, Canada.

Stanley's successful career as a 4-H Club member and as a prize winning exhibitor has been duplicated by many boys and girls residing in the Pacific Northwest. These young people will be much in evidence at the forthcoming show of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition.

In addition to these popular 4-H activities, there will be numerous exhibits at the Exposition including those featuring Beef and Dairy Cattle, Sheep and Goats, Hogs, Horses, Poultry, Pet Stock, Dogs, Land Products and Industrial Exhibits. In addition to these will be the usual number of special exhibits which will prove, as in the past, of great interest. In all, there will be nineteen separate and distinct shows.

Entertainment features this year, according to T. B. Wilcox, Jr., President of the Exposition, will include the customary brilliant Horse Show and thrilling Rodeo, the Calf Scramble which will be of very special interest to 4-H boys, Carol Henry and "Sweetheart," America's premier High School horse, and the famous Portland Police Band.

This year's show, in so far as entertainment is concerned, will unquestionably set a new high standard. At least such a result is confidently anticipated by Wilcox and his associates.

Rail Crossing Accidents Up

Railroad crossing accidents have skyrocketed in Oregon this year, it has been disclosed by Robert S. Farrell, Jr., secretary of state.

In the first half of 1946 the death toll at crossings more than doubled the toll of the same period last year, with total automobile-train collisions amounting to 129. Other traffic accidents, while on the rise, have not kept pace with this type.

"While increased car travel and speeded rail schedules are factors," said Farrell, "the real blame is on the drivers. Only when an electric signal fails does the fault lie on anyone except the man at the wheel."

Fall Seeding Can Be Done Now

Fall seeding of pastures and hay can be made to advantage this time of the year on cultivated lands or in the ashes of burned over logged off land, states Geo. A. Nelson, county agent. There has been considerable moisture already this year with the early fall rains to insure sprouting of seed planted.

The importance of doing a small amount of seeding where it is not possible to make a larger seeding is important states Mr. Nelson. If a few brush piles are burned in the pasture, this should be seeded to a good pasture mixture, rather than to let it come up to weeds.

Where there has been no burning and cattle have trampled the grounds, it is possible to make a small seeding to add to pasture production.

There are various pasture mixtures that can be used depending upon conditions of the grounds and the uses to be made of the pasture. Some of the important grasses to be used as a basis for this pasture are the alta fescue, creeping red fescue, and chewing fescue and along with this is the white and alsike clover, lotus major, and sub-clover. Other grasses of importance are the pyrenneal rye, orchard grass, and the meadow fox tail.

The various mixtures recom-

mended can be found in bulletins No. 2 entitled "Planting and Managing Columbia County Pastures" which can be obtained at the county agent's office upon request.
