8. Bill would preserve Oregon's No. 1 food fish—our salmon, and our No. 1 tourist attraction—our steelhead.
9. Oregon's tourist trade is developing into one of its great businesses. More than \$100,000,000.00—which is more than 10 times the value of our commercial salmon and steelhead runs—will be brought into the state by our tourists who will come here to enjoy our beaches, mountains, lakes and fish life.

IT'S YOUR FISH!

Our fish life is one of Oregon's great natural resources. It is a No. 1 tourist attraction. These fish belong to all the people—all over the state and should be protected by all. Remember! When our coastal streams are stripped of their fish then our mountain streams and lakes will have to carry the whole fishing load. For a short time at best. Our coastal streams are in a critical condition NOW. Help save what is left.
