TIMBER—Mr. and Mrs. "Blackie" Brown are the proud owners of a new sedan purchased last week.

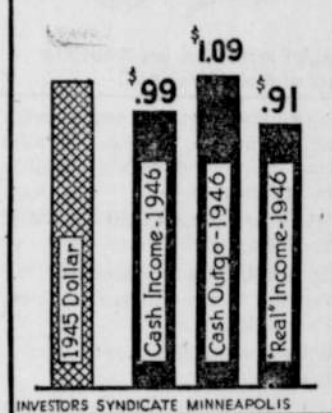

American 'Real Income' In July Off 9 Cents On \$1 From Year Ago

PURCHASING POWER JULY 1945 vs JULY 1946



THE above chart, showing how the average American fared in national income changes in the last twelve months, is based on the monthly consumers' study of Investors Syndicate of Minneapolis.

The American public in July had a "real income" of 91 cents, or 9 cents on the dollar less than in July, 1945. This "real income" is not a subtraction of cash income and expenditures but an average relative of these figures designed to show how living costs affect adjusted income dollars.

Cash income of the American public in July was 99 cents for every \$1 a year earlier. The following changes per dollar were: wages off 9 cents, salaries off 13 cents on the dollar less than in July, 1945. This "real income" is not a subtraction of cash income and expenditures but an average relative of these figures designed to show how living costs affect adjusted income dollars.
