List Issued of Prohibited Items

Indecision over what items are acceptable as mailable material will be removed to a large extent by a list issued this week by Postmaster Emil Messing who received it from the chief post office inspector at Washington, D.C. The postal laws provide severe penalties for mailing any of the following:

Intoxicating beverages, inflammable matter such as matches, lighter fluid and other articles likely to cause fire, ammunition and all other explosives, firearms such as revolvers, pistols, narcotics, extortion letters and lottery and fraudulent matter.

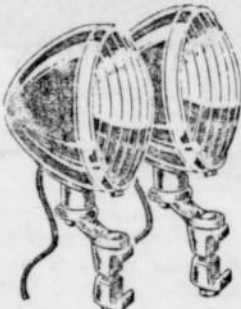
