LOGGERS LOSE CLOSE COURT FRAY FRIDAY

The Vernonia Loggers almost downed the league-leading St. Helens Lions on the local floor February 7, but lost to the Lions 30-25.

It wasn't until the third quarter that the Loggers got down to business and really played ball, scoring 13 points, over half of the total scored. The Loggers waited too long before they started scoring, because if they had played ball all through the game as they did in the third period, St. Helens would have had two losses instead of one. Perhaps if the Loggers could have had a few more minutes, they could have more than closed the five-point gap.

Extensive fouling was committed by both teams, each making 18 personal fouls. One technical foul was called against Vernonia for failure to report, and three were called against St. Helens, one for failure to report, one on entering the game without being waved onto the floor by officials, and one against the St. Helens rooting section for booing.

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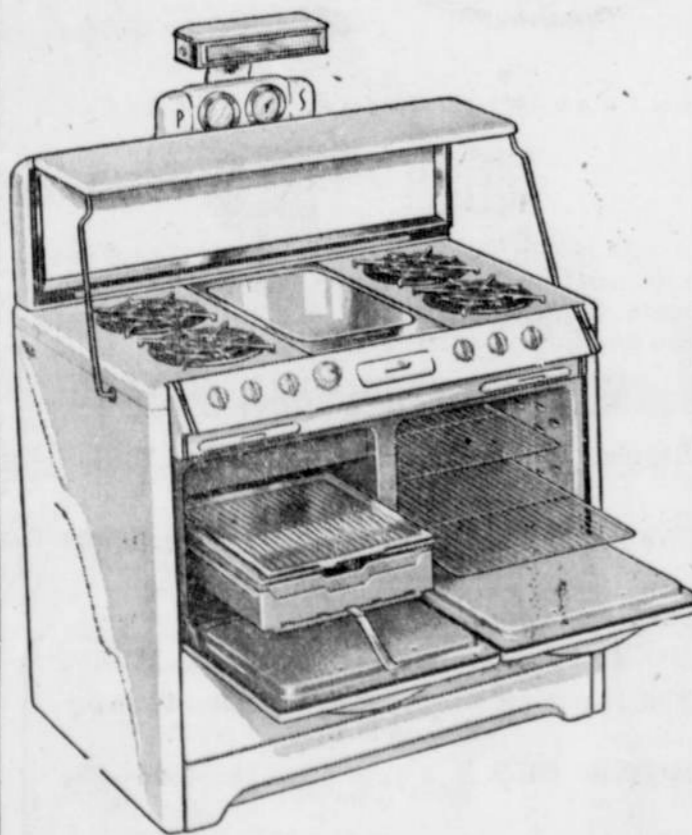
