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4-Hers Go to OSC June 17

The annual host of 4-H club boys and girls, 1800 to 1900 strong, depending only on available space to house them, will take over the Oregon State college campus June 17 to 27 for their 32nd annual club summer session. Definite dates and plans have just been announced by L. J. Allen, acting state club leader.

Every county in the state will send a delegation determined in size by a quota given in advance based on the number completing projects in 1946. Priority in selection will go first to those winning scholarships in state competition followed by sectional and county winners, those financed by communities and those financed by clubs and others, Allen explained.

Delegates will be housed in halls, fraternities, sororities and other quarters to the extent available. Meals will be the same in each living group as uniform menus are prepared in advance by Miss Georgia Bibee, director of dormitories.

Classes in a wide variety of subjects will occupy the morning hours each day. College staff members and visiting specialists will teach these classes in which laboratory work and demonstrations will be emphasized.

Home folks will be able to follow the activities through the state radio station, KOAC, which will broadcast daily assemblies from 2 to 3 o'clock, county broadcasts from 7:30 to 8 o'clock and the annual radio revue June 25 starting at 8 o'clock.

Other afternoon activities include daily county delegation meetings after lunch and recreation from 3:30 to 5:30 o'clock supervised by members of the physical education staff. Evening programs vary from day to day.

Sunday, June 22, delegates may attend a special church service in the Men's Gym on the campus, which also will be broadcast at 11 o'clock, or may attend any of the Corvallis church services.

Facilities of the college infirmary and its entire staff will be available to help safeguard the health of the delegates, each of whom must submit a health certificate in advance.

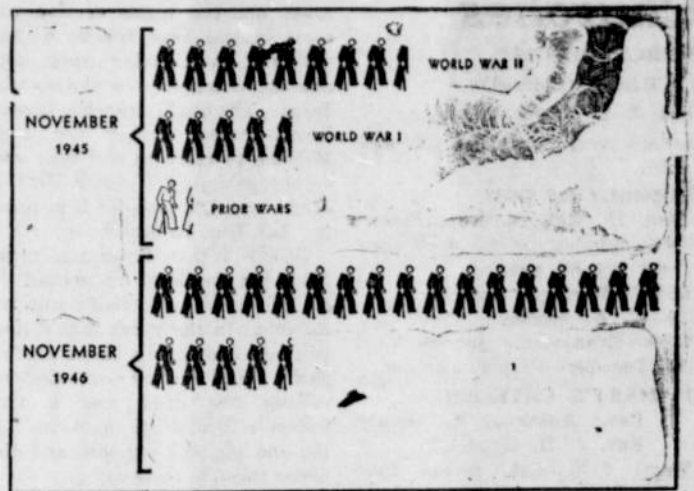
Lots of equipment has been arriving from California for the oil well this week.

WORLD WAR II PENSION ROLL DOUBLES IN YEAR



The number of World War II veterans drawing disability compensation has doubled during the past year, statistics recently released by the Veterans Administration reveal. While the World War I roll remained stationary, and deaths cut those from prior wars by 8,000, the list from pensionable disabilities incurred during the last war climbed from 859,762 to 1,682,216 between December 1, 1945 and the same date this year. Each figure in above drawing represents 100,000 active cases.



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
