

LOGGERS WIN TWO MORE; HAVE CHAMP CHANCE

INDIANS DROP CLOSE GAME

In a big third-inning rally with four hits and three runs, the Loggers defeated Scappoose 3 to 2 in a tightly-played contest. The teams met here Tuesday afternoon of this week.

This game leaves the Indians with two losses and they still have Rainier, Seaside and St. Helens to play. The Loggers still have a chance to tie for the championship providing Scappoose loses one of its three remaining games and providing Vernonia wins the next two games with Parkrose and Rainier.

The Loggers play at Parkrose today, Thursday, and Rainier here next Tuesday.

In the third inning, the Loggers scoring frame, Stuve doubled, hitting the grade school building. Frank singled to left field and Williams singled through third base into left field, scoring Stuve. Nightwine doubled to center field, scoring Frank and Williams. Schaumburg grounded out to short stop. Wantland forced Wilcoxon, a courtesy runner for Nightwine, at third and K. Miller grounded out to second base. Three runs, four hits.

Dick Nightwine played the game despite a severe ankle injury sustained in Monday's track meet at Scappoose on a pole vault attempt. Don Cline was unable to play because of a boil on his neck. Cline's hitting is desperately needed and it is hoped he will be okeh for today's game at Parkrose.

At McMinnville two other Loggers also placed, Don Cline getting fourth in the discus and Glen Woods, fourth in the mile.

At the Scappoose-Vernonia meet held last Monday in Scappoose, Fredrickson also placed first in the mile and the half mile. Bill Biddle took top honors in the high hurdles, low hurdles and broad jump. Carmichael took first in the 440 and Refro won the Discus throwing.

Other contestants placing in this meet included Nightwine who took fourth in the 100-yard dash and second in the 220 and third in pole vaulting. Alvin Tapp took third in the 100-yard dash, Bill Shipman placed third in the javelin throwing and Normand Mills and Dick May tied for second in the half-mile run.

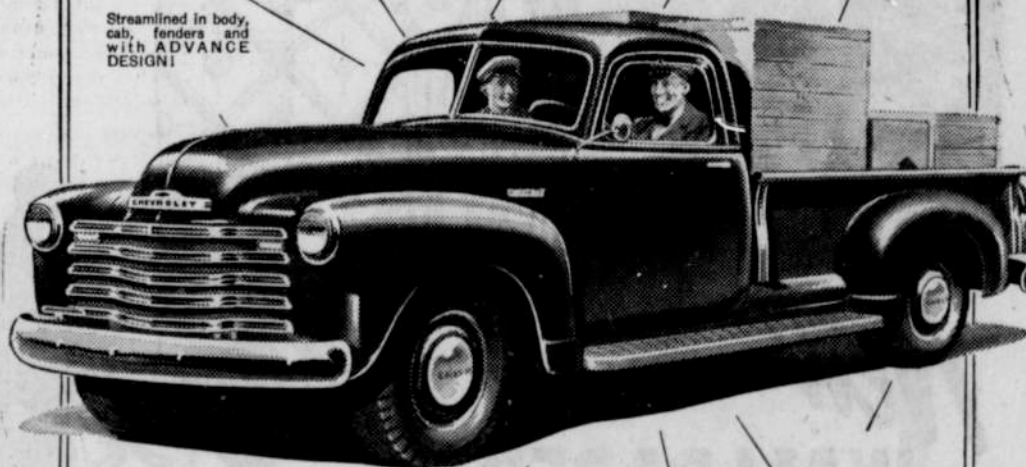
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
