AIRPORT LIGHTS SLATED

McMINNVILLE — Lights are expected to be installed on the 4800 foot eastwest runway of McMinnville's municipal airport by this fall. This is the most used runway on the local port and will open the field to 24 hour use, greatly increasing the prospects for additional cargo flights out of the field.

Installation of runway lights and revolving beacon will eliminate one handicap which has prevented greater use of the local port on turkey poult shipments.

NEW SCHOOL PLANNED

FOREST GROVE — Long-term policy looking toward the construction of a new Forest Grove high school plant upon a 20-acre site was formulated last week at a special meeting of the district's directors with members of the budget committee.

Agreement of the group was for immediate purchase of 20 acres which would meet the state standard requirements for a high school up to 800 enrollment.

FROST HITS BERRIES

BANKS — Ten to 20 per cent losses in strawberry fields due to recent frosts was reported by B. L. Sellers of Banks, secretary of the United Berry Growers of Washington county.

Frosts struck both high and low land fields, Sellers reported. He estimated an average loss of 15 per cent over the county.

"The frosts have wrecked the first picking pretty generally," the berry grower said.
