## Unemployment Payments Up

Unemployment insurance to Oregon's covered workers reached \$1,113,109 in December for the highest monthly figure since April, 1946, but the year's payments of \$7,744,168 were \$8,367 lower than in 1947 and less than half the 1946 record total of over 16 millions. The unemployment compensation commission reports.

Readjustment allowances to unemployed veterans also rose considerably last month to \$562,677, but here again the 1948 total of \$5,134,740 failed by \$847,602 to reach the previous year's figure.

December's payments of \$1,675,786 to civilians and veterans was 27.3 per cent higher than the combined figure for December, 1947. It more than doubled the \$764,932 paid in November, 1948.

Checks went out to 17,147 civilians and 8,370 veterans during the last week of the old year as compared to 8,160 civilians and 3,441 veterans just five weeks before. A year ago checks went to 8,414 civilians and 4,122 veterans, while two years ago the comparable figures were 6,570 and 6,771.

Filing of 16,489 new claims last month established a new record since the July-to-June benefit year went into effect in 1947. The commission now has 53,929 claims on file as against 42,587 a year ago. In December, 1947, only 7,559 new claims were received.

## In Oregon

### PLANE LANDING MADE

McMINNVILLE — First commercial night airplane flight to touch down at McMinnville's municipal airport came in Sunday night of last week at 6:15 without a hitch, unloaded one parcel, and then took off southbound without further ado.

The West Coast Airlines plane was allowed to land through the granting of provisional authority for such a night landing by the air carrier command.

### COFFERS GAIN \$11,000

FOREST GROVE — Forest Grove parking meters enriched the city treasury by \$11,024.53 in 1948, City Manager M. O. Gardner announced. Half of this amount however, went to pay for the meters.

City budget committee members estimate parking meter revenues for the current fiscal year, will reach \$11,000.

Weekly average in 1948 was \$212. The monthly average was \$918.66.

### VFW GOAL \$11,000

SHERIDAN — Approximately \$1000 of a \$12,000 figure has been realized from recent sale of debenture bonds on the VFW building project.

The post is endeavoring to raise about \$12,000 to apply to the building so as to be eligible for a recent \$10,000 donation from the Associated Plywood mill at Willamina.

### HEAVY HAULING BANNED

HILLSBORO — All Washington county-owned roads were closed to all heavy hauling January first by order of the county court.

The load limit was reduced to five tons per axle December 15 because of flood conditions which undermined roadbeds. Freezing weather which followed caused further damage.

The heavy hauling ban will be in effect until weather conditions permit such traffic again, it was indicated.

### ENGINEERS START WORK

SEASIDE — The army engineers took over the burden of the attempt to stop erosion at the mouth of the Necanicum river Monday of last week when work was started on a \$50,000 emergency job designed to protect the

sewage disposal plant. The question of the erosion of the ocean front immediately south of the mouth of the Necanicum was still unsolved, with members of the engineering staff indicating that very little could be done to protect an area near which several homes have been built.

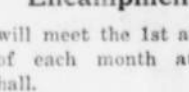

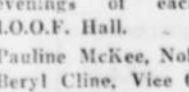
