## Clothing Draws Most Members

4-H clothing clubs in Columbia county can boast of a larger enrollment of 4-H club members than other types of 4-H club work in this county, Harold Black, extension agent (4-H club), reported last week.

There are now twenty 4-H clothing clubs with an enrollment of 185 members. This compares to 19 clubs with 170 members during last year.

The objective in the clothing projects is to teach girls how they may be well dressed for what they can afford to spend for clothes.

The first division of clothing is devoted to learning the basic principles of sewing and the making of such articles as: needle cases, pin cushions, luncheon cloths, head scarfs, table scarfs, crocheted or knitted wash cloths and beanies and laundry bags.

Division two, three, and four deal with making clothes for wear at home, clothes for school and sports wear, best dresses, informal party dresses, and suits.

All clothing members are eligible to exhibit at the county fair, as well as take part in demonstration and judging contests. Girls in the upper divisions may compete in the style review. In this contest each girl models clothing which she has made during the year.

Boys can enroll in a bachelor

sewing project. In this kind of club the members learn to patch, darn, sew on buttons, clean and press trousers, besides making camp aprons, carpentry aprons, holders, emergency kits, knife sheaths and hatchet sheaths.

## Two Bulletins Prove Helpful

A pair of much read bulletins—"Garden Soil Management" and "Farm and Home Vegetable Gardens"—written by an outstanding Oregon garden authority, Professor A. G. B. Bouquet of O.S.C. are again being offered to home vegetable gardeners through county extension offices or direct from the college.

Both are "classics" in their respective fields. "Garden Soil Management," No. 612, suggests ways and means of garden soil improvement, fertilization and handling.

As a handy folder, Bouquet has incorporated a planting calendar in the other bulletin, No. 614, "Farm and Home Vegetable Garden." He lists 41 common garden crops with recommended varieties, row space of each to accommodate a family of five, as well as planting

dates. Such details as amount of seed required for various row lengths, depth of seed planting, approximate maturing dates and yields to be expected are also included.
