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Moth Protection Easy with DDT

It's clothes moth time again. Spring and summer months are the season when the moths will most likely damage your Sunday suit, according to a timely household reminder passed along by Mrs. Maud C. Casswell, county extension agent.

Actually, clothes moths never stop working in well heated houses, but warm weather months are normally the season for extensive moth damage in neglected woolen garments. Infrequently, worn and soiled clothing are most likely to be damaged.

For that closet, trunk or drawer space where woolen clothing is hung or stored, the clothing specialist recommends a thorough spray job using five per cent DDT residential solution. If the solution is a non-staining oil, it may be sprayed directly on clothing without harm.

Clothing as well as closet or trunk walls, baseboards including cracks and crevices must be covered for complete protection.

Mrs. Casswell points out that moth eggs hatch in five days after they are laid by the adult female. Thus time is short between exposure and time in which

Damage may be done unless protective measures are taken. Larvae, the moth "worms," eat the woolen fibers; not the adult moths. Likely places for moths to deposit eggs are in pants cuffs, collars, pocket flaps and garment seams. With a residual type DDT spray, larvae hatched after the actual spray operation will be destroyed by coming in contact with dried spray left on walls or clothing.
