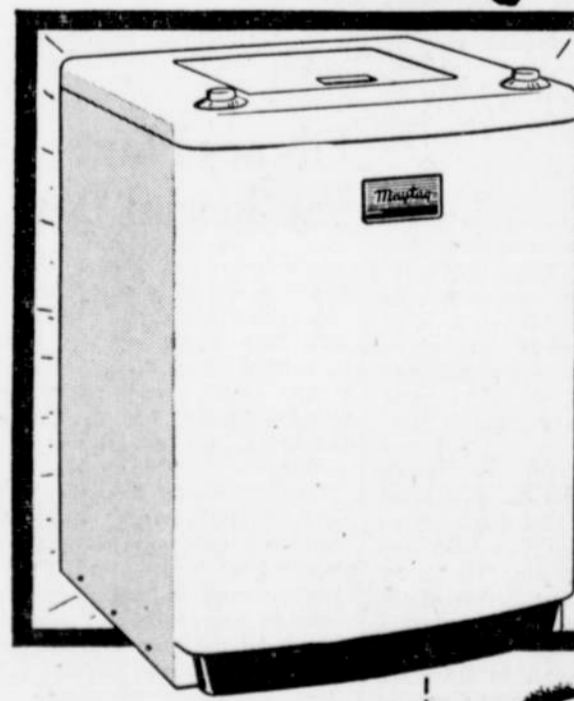
"What a loss to science!" sighs Miss Gilbert. "No one this day knows what electricity really is, and here we have a genius who could explain it—but forgot!"

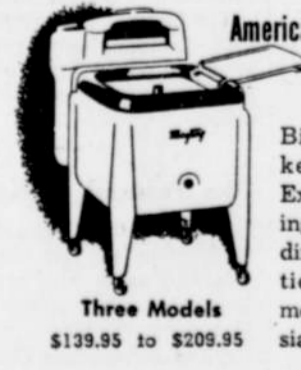
