NOTICE TO PERSONAL PROPERTY OWNERS OF COLUMBIA COUNTY

Chapter 342, Sec. 110-349 Provides that every person and managing agent or officer of any firm or corporation or association owning or having possession or control of taxable personal property, shall make a return thereof to the county assessor of the county in which such property is located on January 1st, 1952. The final date for filing this return is March 2nd, 1952. In 1949 this Law was amended making it mandatory that the assessor add the penalty of 5% to the tax on all returns that are filed after the said March 2nd, 1952.

However, if you will co-operate by filing your report now, you will do your part in reducing the cost of making this assessment; also eliminate having the penalty added to your personal tax.

Blanks have been mailed to all personal property owners shown on the 1951 tax roll. However, if you are a new owner or have not received a blank, call St. Helens 12, or drop a card to the Assessor's office, St. Helens, Oregon and you will receive the necessary form.

Social Security

"Am I self-employed?" That is the question most often asked about Social Security now, according to Everell Cummins, field representative of the Portland social security office.

"If you work for yourself in an unincorporated trade or business and have net earnings of at least \$400 per year, you are self-employed under the Social Security Act," said Cummins. He explained that farm income, earnings of most professionals, and investment income do not count toward social security credit. All other self-employment earnings up to \$3600 are taxable at the rate of 2½%.

According to the representative, the next question is, "what will I get out of social security?" The answer given is: "Up to \$80 per month for a self-employed person retiring after age 65; up to \$40 for his wife; and up to \$150 a month for a widow with minor children."

The 4-H dormitory which is now getting underway on the county fairgrounds was discussed with the Granges asked to support this effort in their usual generous manner, with donated labor and other help.

The county Grange history which is planned as a memorial to the achievements of the Grange is being assembled. Also plans are going forward to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Pomona Grange later this year. The event will be planned by the historian, Pearl Becker, Pomona lecturer, Mrs. Erickson and the lecturers of 13 subordinate Granges.

Guests during the days were Mr. and Mrs. Ray W. Gill of Portland. Mr. Gill, who was formerly State Master, is now a member of the state Grange executive committee.

After a very entertaining pro-

gram in the evening, the Degree of Pomona was exemplified for a class of candidates.

The next Pomona Grange meeting will be held in Vernonia in May.
