Next Monday, January 12, is the date for the opening of the 47th state legislative assembly. People of the state are accustomed to seeing in print the antics that sometimes take place at the legislature and they expect the session to bring forth quite a mass of new laws and changes to existing laws.

What is probably little known is the preparation necessary before the assembly begins its biennial session. There is a lot of work to be done before the 60 representatives and 30 senators begin work.

Crews of workmen have been busy for weeks assembling the endless numbers of items from desks and tables to pencils and paper clips required. Custodial employes have been cleaning the house and senate chambers, dusting desks, vacuuming carpets, moving additional tables and desks into the chambers and checking the hundreds of light bulbs which light the rooms.

Over 100 items of stationery, law books and other supplies each legislature receives are being distributed by Cyril Colbath, storekeeper, who has served in every legislature since 1919. One hundred twenty-six typewriters, in storage since the 1951 session, have been taken out of storage and readied for action and 27 extra telephones have been installed. In addition to other preparations, provisions have been made for extra ground patrolmen to direct parking and capitol guides are making plans for guiding the hundreds of visitors which attend the sessions.

At present more than 70 classes from Oregon schools have made tour reservations for more than 3,000 grade school and high school students.

The current March of Dimes campaign emphasizes the indebtedness of this county to the National Foundation for funds borrowed for treatment of people who contracted the disease. Payment for the indebtedness and for polio case treatment in the future can come only from the contributions of people themselves. Their consideration in giving more than usual to the fund is urgently needed because the purpose to which this money is devoted is a worthwhile one. Word that Oregon will participate quite extensively in research work in the quest for an answer to polio came a few weeks ago when a grant of \$49,804 was made the University of Oregon medical school by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

At present the diagnosis of polio must depend upon an evaluation by the physician of clinical symptoms which frequently are vague or may resemble other diseases. The physician has no specific laboratory test generally available to aid him in making a diagnosis on a patient.

The grant will enable scientists at the medical school to attempt to adapt research methods as laboratory aids to the diagnosis of polio.
