OUT OF THE WOODS . . .

Who Is Boss? In his new book, "Forest Policy," W. B. Greeley declares: "The necessary degree of public regulation of private forestry and the levels of authority by which it should be enforced remain foremost problems of American policy. . . . The criticism of American (forest) policy is ineffective as directed by public agencies particularly toward its results upon small woodlands. . . . The wood lot, with its preponderant acreage is now viewed in official circles as the 'hard core' of the national problem and the most urgent field for public regulation."

These statements by the highest industrial forestry authority in harness are not only living facts of today but they visualize issues of the future. None is more important than this one, "Is the typical owner among America's 4,000,000 proprietors of small woodlands to continue to be his own boss in the timber on which he pays taxes?"

For a common objective of all the organizations, groups and parties that are after the scalps of Secretaries Benson and McKay, is socialization of the nation's forest resources, right down to the last stump patch.

Book for the Schools Col. Greeley's new book is the latest in "The American Forestry Series" of college textbooks. These publications by the world-famed firm of McGraw-Hill now number 22. Their subjects range from "Forest Pathology" to "Forestry and Its Career Opportunities" by Harp Shirley. They are mainly technical books. Greeley's "Forest Policy" is expository throughout. It projects and illuminates the forest policies of all major timber countries with the hand of a master.

"Forest Policy" was written for college students, particularly for those of such institutions as the College of Forestry, University of Washington, and the Oregon State Forestry School. But Bill Greeley is an old ranger and a born narrator, and the arts practiced by campfire and on trail enliven "Forest Policy" even as they animate the author's best selling "Forests and Men." In short, here is a textbook that is highly readable for anybody who is at all interested in reading about trees and travel. A vital style brightens even the more technical pages.

Because of these qualities, "Forest Policy" is a book that may be used effectively in high-school social, economic, and history studies. Conservation teachers in junior schools should find it useful too. Sweden and Russia One of the most interesting and informative chapters is entitled "The Democratic Forest Policies of Scandinavia." In Sweden, it tells, the keystone of forest policy is in forest controls by county boards as established in a law of

1903—a law that has worked well for 50 years. The Swedish county forest board is set up on a framework of governmental rules but it's authority is in elected county officials and farm and forest owners within the county. The golden rule is "Education and Cooperation", with the law a last resort. And when the law is called on to correct bad forest practices it is county deputies and not Federal policemen who are called in. "Cooperation," states Col. Greeley, "is the heart of Swedish forestry."

"The forest Policy of Russia" presents a picture that is in extreme contrast to that of the forests and men of the Scandinavian countries. The author has gathered up an amazing amount of detailed information on timber development in the Soviet Union. With it he gives the main elements of the Five Year Plan of 1950, which set up wood requirements four times as great as those of the pre-war years. Machines and power tools in the woods, with slave labor, are the combination for vastly increased timber production in Malenkov's country.

Social Security

(NOTE: This, another of a series of articles on social security, tells you how the money which is eventually passed out as benefits. The article comes from the Portland social security office.)

Federal old-age and survivors insurance benefits are paid for by a contribution (or tax) from the employee's wages and the self-employed individual's earnings from his trade or business. If you are a wage earner, you and your employer share equally in the tax. If you are self-employed, you pay three-fourths as much as the total payment of employee and employer would be on the same amount of earnings. If you are working for wages, your contribution is deducted from your pay each payday.

The employer sends your contribution and his own to the director of Internal Revenue with a tax return showing your name, your social security number and the amount of your wages. This is done quarterly. If you are self-employed, you must report your earnings and pay your contributions each year when you file your individual income tax returns. Schedule Ca of your income tax return Form 1040 is used for this purpose.

There is no age limitation on this matter. The social security tax must be paid regardless of the age of the individual. Your wages and self-employment income are posted to your individual record by the social security administration from this social security tax return. This record of your earnings will be used to determine your eligibility for benefits and the amount you will receive.
