Clearing Work Awarded by BPA

tion has awarded O. T. Elliott, Yelm, Washington, a contract to clear right-of-way for the Forest Grove-Timber transmission line on their low bid of \$55,063, Thomas E. Black, BPA's lower Columbia district manager, announced August 26 at Vancouver.

The contract provides for clearing a right-of-way 21 miles long by 100 feet wide, construction of access roads and felling all danger trees. It will take about eight months to complete the job.

"Award of the clearing contract this year is preparatory to construction of a 115,000-volt power line in 1954 that will carry additional Columbia river energy into Oregon's, Clatsop, Washington and Columbia counties," said Black.

O. T. Elliott is to begin work within ten days and expects to complete the job in April, 1954. The completion of the power line to the Sunset substation of West Oregon Electric will provide this part of the Cooperative area with a two-way connection with Bonneville power.

REGISTRATION FOR FIRST DAY 176 AT HIGH SCHOOL

First day student enrollment figures at the high school indicated a decrease in the number of students this year as compared with the number that first signed for classes at the start of 1952. The opening day total was compiled and released Tuesday morning by Superintendent Eugene

Monday's total was 176 students. a considerable drop from the first day a year ago when 190 signed up for classes. It is likely, however, the number will grow in the coming week or so as late registrations come in. This increase takes place each year and s expected by school authorities.

GRADES DECREASE TO 479, DIVISION CAUSE OF PROBLEM

The Vernonia elementary chools opened Monday with a slight decrease in enrollment from the previous year of 509 students. with 479 students enrolled by Tuesday. While there was an overall decrease in the number of students enrolled, the first grade showed an increase over last year with 84 students. The figures were released Tuesday by Superintendent Darrold Proehl.

Other class figures showed 62 second, 49 third, 44 fourth, 48 fifth, 43 sixth, 58 seventh, 41 eighth and 47 kindergarten stu-

Equalization of class loads between the Lincoln and Washington primary rooms was undertaken Tuesday with the transferring of some students in the first grade at Lincoln to the Washington school and some second and third grade students to the Lincoln school.

Parents are asked to cooperate in the transfer from one school to the other if there is a necessity. Both schools are operated under the same administration and follow the same pattern of instruc-
