The situation of children in this county has never been clearly pictured and it is only since a child welfare worker was assigned to this agency this year that any estimate could be thought of. Even so, no estimate has been arrived at and the current feeling is that many children in appalling situations are not being referred. possibly because so little has been done in the past in the area of finding, nor is the agency in position now to launch a finding pro-

> Funds for foster home care were overdrawn, as above, by \$278 in November. Once a child is under care in a foster home, a concentrated effort is made to rehabilitate his own home so that he can again be with his own family. However, the program is a growing one and funds must be transferred from aid to dependent children for foster home care.

WINTER CAUSES INCREASE Old age assistance cost \$17,270 on a \$17,325 budget. This program increases during the winter months.

Aid to disabled grants now to tal \$2,570 on a \$2,600 budget. There is considerable fluctuation in this program. Due to the activity of the vocational rehabilitation divison, a few of the disabled are improved and placed in employment. However, the number of grants increases for the winter months.

Aid to the blind costs \$130 on a budget of \$300. General assis, tance costs for November are comparable to costs for the same month last year, \$1,478 as compared with \$1,481.

Rebuilding Scheduled For Immediate Start; 3 Bids Considered

Rebuilding of the union high school gymnasium and other repair work that will be necessary to restore the school structure is expected to get underway by the first of next week and some equipment will be on hand for the start by the end of this week. That was the information given the district board Tuesday evening after selection of the succesful bidder for the work had been

\$70,400 COST LISTED

The contracting firm submitting the bid chosen by the board is Reimers and Jolivette of Portland. The amount of their bid plus the architect fee is \$70,400. The board signed the construction contract Tuesday upon the advice of John L. Foote, attorney for the high school. He will also review the contractor's conformance bond as soon as it is sub-

The district also submitted to the insurance adjuster the figure of \$12,860.67 which covers losses for renovation of equipment and materials that were smoke and water damaged, for equipment lost and temporary operating ex.

SOME WALLS TO STAND

The board examined complete plans for reconstruction work, which specified that only the west wall of the gym be completely torn down and reconstructed.

The other walls of that part of the building were not burned so badly that studding was damaged. The specifications call for removal of the interior finish, replacement and painting; removal and replacement of ceiling joists and trusses, flooring, mechanical and electrical equipment, bleachers and back stops.

WORK SPECIFIED

Work in the locker rooms is specified as cleaning, re-enameling, retiling floors, replacement of insulation, ductwork and wiring. Cleaning of the walls and replacement of insulation is scheduled for the office area.

Refinishing, replacement of the woodwork where necessary, new floor and ceiling tile, insulationand light fixtures are listed for the main entrance and corrido, s and refinishing for the laundry, toilet rooms and band rooms.

The decision to carry out the vacation proceedings was made at a council meeting earlier this year when planning began for the construction of a new settleing tanz at the plant.
