WEEKLY FOREST MARKET REPORT

Issued Weekly by Extension Department, OSC and USDA

SAWLOGS: No. 2 second-growth Douglas fir sawlogs at Willamette Valley mills ranged from \$30.00 to \$40.00 a thousand, mostly \$34.00 to \$38.00. No. 3's were \$25.00 to \$29.00. Long camp-run logs sold from \$30.00 to \$38.00 a thousand, with mixed second and old-growth going up to \$42.00. Eight-foot logs were \$15.00 to \$16.50 a cord, or \$30.00 to \$38.00 a thousand.

Old-growth Douglas fir sawlogs brought \$40.00 to \$47.50 a thousand for No. 2's and \$25.00 to \$37.50 for No. 3's. Peeler logs sold within a \$20.00 range up to top prices of \$75.00, \$85.00 and \$100.00.

POLES AND PILING: Forty and 45-foot barkie poles were in fair demand at most Willamette Valley pole yards. Forty-five foot barkies ranged from 15 to 23 cents a lineal foot, depending on diameters.

CHRISTMAS TREES: Douglas fir Christmas tree stumps averaged about 25 cents per tree. Good quality trees brought up to 40 cents. Cut trees at the roadside ranged from 40 to 75 cents a tree, with some large, top grade trees bringing a dollar a tree. Wholesale prices averaged about 30 cents a lineal foot.
