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# Loyd Named to M **Vacant County Court Place**

New Commissioner To Hold Remainder Of Unexpired Term

The Columbia county court announces the appointment of Elmer B. Loyd, of Deer Island as county commissioner to fill the unexpired term of Donald Parchar, whose resignation took effect January 1 of this year.

Loyd owns and operates a highimproved Grade A dairy on U. S. Highway 30 just at the south edge of the city of Deer Island.

He was born at Greenville, Washington county, Oregon, in 896, where he lived with his par ents until 1906, when they moved to the vicinity of St. Helens. He attended public schools of Deer Island and later served in the first World War in the navy.

After the first world war, he farmed until 1926 and from 1926 to 1934 he was in the transportation business in and around St Helens. From 1934 to 1945 he worked as an employee with the General Petroleum company of St. Helens and in 1945 formed a partnership and bought the business of E. L. Bartholomew and operated a distributing agency for the General Petroleum Company until the sale of same in 1948 from which date he has operated

Mr. Loyd is a member of the St. Helens Post, American Legion, and is also a member of the board of directors of the St. elens hospital district. At present, he is a member of the veterans advisory committee serving the veterans vocational education program and a member of the Yankton Grange and the Columbla county farm bureau.

Restaurants

Rate Low in Sanitation

Vernonia Earns Lowest Listing, Shows Improvement

Columbia county restaurants didn't fair too well under the comparative sanitation report issued last week by the state department of health. However, improvement was noted.

With a total possible average of 100 points, county eating places managed a 76.46 rating, just two points above the lowest county.

The St. Helens average was 75.4, one point below the county average. Scappoose rated 87, the highest for the county.

According to Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, the present sanitation rating of restaurants in the county is somewhat low, but considerable improvement has been made.

#### PROGRESS GOOD

"We are very pleased with progress made in Columbia county, which now enjoys the services of a full-time public health sanitarian and a nurse as a result of work by a community health council of interested citizens," Erickson said.

He listed the work of county health sanitarian, Ben Rinehart, as one of the big reasons for the improvement. Rinehart has been sanitarian for the past 17 months. According to Rinehart, the remost of the items a customer or-

port covered general sanitation of the eating places and included dinarily would not see. This would include kitchen sanifation, storage, dishwashing techniques and refrigeration facilities.

#### BAD POINTS NOTED

Columbia county restaurants, as a whole, fell down on floor. wall and ceiling sanitation, sani tary construction, and sanitary storage. They rated highest in water sanitation, disease carrier protection and wholesomeness of milk, food and shell fish facilities.

However, the establishments are required by law to keep the later classification clean, Rine hart said.

The lowest rating was given to Vernonia with a score of 73. However one restaurant in Vernonia had the highest rating in the county-94.5. One restaurant in the same town also had the lowest in the county.

Of all the towns, however, Vernonia has shown the greatest improvement, Rinehart said. Aside from one restaurant, they had high ratings.

Vernonia also was lowest in a recent swab rinse count conducted by the state board of health. But there has been great improvement since then, Rinehart added.

#### TO ISSUE CARDS

Other city ratings were Clatskanie, 77 and Rainier, 77.

The second highest rating of 89.5 for an individual restaurant was given to a St. Helens establishment, the report showed.

Rinehart said to continue to improve the situation in the county, rating cards will be issued to the restaurants sometime in January. The cards will rate the places with an A, B, or C grade. They are required by law to keep them posted.

He also said a meeting of all eating establishment operators will be held in mid-January. At the meeting a grading system willbe explained in detail.

Applications for sanitation cer. tificates have been sent to all traveler and tourist facilities in Columbia county that are listed in the state register, according to Ben Rinehart, county sanitarian.

These establishments, which include hotels, motels, camp grounds, trailer courts, cabins and some apartments, now fall under i the jurisdiction of the county department of health, Rinehart said. They were formerly licensed by the state.

#### OFFICER HAS DUTY

Apartment houses falling under the county health officer are those renting by the day or the week to travelers or transients.

However, applications have not been sent to the hotels of the area as they are not listed on the register. These and a few other establishments will have to be picked up later, he said.

# BOND SALES GO OVER MILLION

With the expiration of the year 1953, one phase of business at the Vernonia post office also ceased to exist after being operated since 1941. Announcement of the change was made early this week by Postmaster Emil Messing when he pointed out that the office would no longer handle the sale of government bonds.

Post office employees had been in the bond writing business since 1941. During the period from 1941 through December 31, 1953 the office here has issued bonds in the amount of \$1,328,521,
