PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS: the week of March 21 through 27 is being observed across the nation as national wildlife week, and as an expression of national interest in the conservation and wise use of our natural resources, and

WHEREAS: The theme of national wildlife week for 1954 is "Clean Water for All America," in recognition of the vital importance of water pollution control and abatement to the public welfare and to the future of industry, agriculture, recreation and wildlife, and

WHEREAS: The increased cleanliness of our waters will benefit the citizens of the City of Vernonia through protection of their health, increased usefulness of the waters and increased beauty and value of the community, and

WHEREAS: national wildlife week is to be observed throughout the state of Oregon on proclamation by Governor Paul L. Patterson,

NOW THEREFORE: The week of March 21 through 27, 1954, is hereby proclaimed as national wildlife week in the city of Vernonia. All citizens are urged to acquaint themselves with the facts pertaining to natural resources problems, with particular attention to water and pollution-abatement needs and to support all sound programs designed to conserve clean waters for all beneficial uses of man and wildlife.
