Demonstration Week Observed

"Today's Home Builds Tomorrow's World" is the slogan of National Home Demonstration Week which is being observed from May 2 to 8. Four hundred and eighty five Columbia county women representing eighteen units are part of the county home demonstration program, working for a better tomorrow.

It was in 1913 that the germ of an idea began. The Secretary of Agriculture wrote a number of rural wives asking how the Department could best serve them. Back came the answers asking for get-together clubs of information and cooperation.

Shortly after that, in 1914, the Smith-Lever Act became a law and with it came the establishment of the Extension Service and the home demonstration program with which the Land Grant Colleges, the U. S. Department of Agriculture and local county governments cooperate.

Last year over the nation 1,200-

000 local leaders were actively engaged in bring new information to American families.

In Oregon the home demonstration program is 22 years old. About 15,617 women take part through 536 home extension units. Groups of women who are interested in participating in the extension program may organize a unit in their community. These units meet once each month to receive instruction from county extension agents or their own trained leaders.

After learning subject matter skills in county-wide training meeting, 9,076 leaders in 1953-54 conducted workshops in their respective communities. All phases of family living were included in the program of work. They are foods and nutrition, home management, home furnishings, clothing and textiles, housing and family life.
