No doubt anyone who reads a newspaper or listens to a radio is aware of the efforts of the Oregon civil defense agency. Planning for civil defense has been underway by that agency for some time and considerable progress has been made to provide for civilian population in the event of bombing.

With the explosion of the newest and largest bomb development a short time ago, planning for dispersal of city population has been a big topic because there is, as yet, no sure way to stop an all-out enemy air attack once it is launched. The agency says the surest way to reduce the number killed and injured is to provide means of emptying a city of its people.

Another point to be taken into consideration is the keeping of others from entering the area. Every person entering a target area prior to an attack is likely to be one more casualty. When an air-raid warning is received, thousands of lives can be saved by immediately activating traffic control points to prevent others from entering the area.

The agency announces a two-day practice, to be called Operation Alert, dealing with this particular phase of civil defense on the dates of June 14-15. State police officers will man pre-designated traffic control points in Clackamas, Columbia, Hood River, Marion, Polk, Yamhill and Washington counties.

In addition, county sheriffs in these areas have been requested to set up at least three traffic control points in their jurisdiction and Portland police will set up similar points within their city.

For this exercise, motorists will be handed a slip of paper explaining the practice and then will be permitted to continue their trip. Buses, planes, ships and trains traveling toward Portland will also be stopped for a short time June 14.
