## Bear Damaging Young Fir Trees

Reports have reached the state forestry department that bears are damaging small second growth timber in certain areas of western Oregon.

The damage appears so serious that the forestry department made an extensive airplane survey of forests to determine the extent of the depredations. Currently, damage appears south of Tillamook and two somewhat larger areas in Clatsop and one in Columbia. Serious loss from bears was first reported from the Grays Harbor area of the state of Washington.

The bears seemingly have acquired a taste for the tender inner bark or cambium of the young firs with the result that many of them have been completely stripped. Deep claw and tooth marks are left on the mutilated stems of the saplings. In some areas, damage runs to 90 per cent of the stand of trees.

In the Fortuna district in the coastal area of California, the Hammond Lumber company has reported that depredations by black bears are putting them out of the tree farming business.

Officials at the state forestry department say that ground surveys will be made of damaged areas and after a report is made, studies for control measures will be instigated.

## Social Security

What are you buying in social security? Mostly this question brings a fairly vague answer about so much a month at age 65.

But do you know what else? Besides retirement benefits at age 65 benefits payable include survivors insurance to the deceased workers family. Like automobile collision insurance, we all hope we never collect on survivors insurance, but it is well to know what is there.

For the workers growing family, are monthly benefits to the children under age 18 and to the widow who has these children in her care. These payments can total \$168.90 a month.

Other survivor benefits payable can be to the widow or dependent widower aged 65, or finally, dependent parents aged 65 if no entitled spouse or children survive.

In practically all cases a lump-sum death payment is payable on an insured worker's death.

We suggest you inquire now about survivor benefits and have the information available to your family just in case. Your social security office or representative will provide additional details as to benefits and proofs necessary to start payments.
