The Loggers started the game all wound up like a clock spring and let the Gulls jump off to a first quarter lead 20-13. In the second quarter the Vernonians got hold of themselves and began playing the type of ball that they are capable of playing.

At halftime the score favored the Gulls 34-30.

It was Bud Fulton in the second half who sparked his Logger tea m. He hit 10 for 11 free-throws and scored four field goals for a total of 18 points in the second half. It was Bud plus a pair of timely fieldgoals by Chuck Cunningham and Pat O'Brien that put the Loggers in the lead 50-49 at the end of the third quarter.

It was anybody's game up until the last 39 seconds when Bobby Crowston on a fast break received a pass from Hank Bass and drove for the basket. City residents can expect a general aspect of torn-up streets and alleys as well as some lots during the coming summer because of projects that are slated to start when spring weather permits.

One bid, already awarded, provides for street work that will bring installation of approximately 5800 feet of curbing for that area east of Rock creek. The contract, when completed, will very nearly complete the curbing of streets in that area and will provide a much better appearing street system for residences in that region.

Oregon's Water Problems Studied

Water appears plentiful to us during these winter months. But from June through September, we hear on every side the need for more water to irrigate our crops, to sprinkle our lawn or to run an industrial plant, observes County Extension Agent, Don Coin Walrod. This problem of enough water to meet our needs during the dry season promises to become acute as our population increases, our industries grow and farm demands become greater.

A study of Oregon's water problems has been underway since August 1953 by the State Water Resources committee that was established by legislation that year. This committee has compiled data for use in planning ways to meet these problems and will make recommendations to the forty-eighth legislative assembly. The report is now available.

Walrod suggests that citizens give this report careful study since only through an informed citizenry can our state water problems be solved.

on this project will come torn-up streets and parking strips. Home owners living on those streets where curb work is scheduled will no doubt be inconvenienced until the work is done.

Incidentally, the bid amount of \$144 per lineal foot for the job is considerably less than was anticipated by City Engineer S. A. Ross before bids were opened at the January 3 council meeting. As a result, property assessments will be less than anticipated.

Although bids have not been called for the sewer construction project, plans for the work are nearing completion Ross indicated at the same meeting when the curb bids were opened. He plans to complete engineering details shortly so this work can also be started in the spring.

The area to receive the brunt of this work will be Corey Hill, with some few exceptions elsewhere in town. Trenches for mains as well as home connections will result in another picture of change that will be disagree-

able for the summer.

With all of this, the advancement to be achieved will be well worth the trouble caused during the time of construction.

Meddling with boxes of patrons of Uncle Sam's mail routes can be a serious matter if the person who is causing the trouble is caught. A case of this kind has been reported to the post office within recent days where rocks have been thrown at the box and some of the contents have been taken out.

Youngsters are thought to be responsible for using this particular box as a target for rock throwing and if this is the case, parents of the young people will no doubt be held responsible for the damage.

The post office department doesn't like this sort of thing and has some definite rules regarding depredation of boxes. Those causing the trouble will no doubt be identified and when they are, a post office inspector will take over on handling the offense.
