Adventists Plan Mission Offering

April 23 will be "One Hundred Million Dollar Day" at the Vernonia Seventh-day Adventist church, it was announced recently.

On that day offerings from Sabbath School members throughout the world will probably total \$100,000,000 since children and adults began giving in this division of the Adventist church in 1886.

It was stated that all of this sum has been used through the years for foreign missions expansion. The \$98,000,000 mark was reached by Adventists on December 17, 1954. The prediction by the church's statistical department that April 23 will be the day on which the \$100,000,000 mark will be reached is based on the current rate of offerings within the denomination.

Last year members of 19,262 Sabbath Schools gave nearly \$6,000,000.
