Dusting Needed For Pea Weevil

Home gardeners will need to start taking steps to control pea weevil to prevent weevily peas.

Pea weevils have begun to emerge from their winter hibernation quarters reports Don Coin Waldrod, county extension agent. These adult weevils are the ones that need to be killed before they lay their eggs.

Dusting the peas when the first pods appear provides effective control, but the dusting will need to be repeated at 5 to 7 day intervals until the peas are harvested.

Insecticides recommended for dusting include a five per cent DDT dust, a three-quarters of one percent rotenone dust, or a five percent methoxychlor dust. The DDT is not recommended if the pea vines are to be fed to dairy cattle or livestock being finished for slaughter.
