

PICTURED above is Bill Pringle, center, and his helper, Eric Feasey, using Pringle's horse, Red, to get out timbers from an area on the Columbia Tree Farm on Oblack road for use in the restoration of Fort Clatsop on its original site south of Astoria as a part of the Lewis and Clark Sesquicentennial celebration being held in Clatsop county August 21-23. Four hundred pieces were gotten out from under-story trees in a 50-year stand owned by Crown Zellerbach. They were shipped from here to the Astoria airport to be framed and set up and sent to Wauna for a preservative treatment known as Wolmanizing before being taken to the old Fort Clatsop site for final erection. Pictured below is the restored fort as it should appear when completed. Rolf Klep, former Astorian and now an architect in New York city, drew plans for the restoration. He searched archives for a description of the fort, six miles southwest of Astoria, after original site was located by the Oregon Historical society. Each of two barracks will be 50x15 feet, with 20x50-foot parade ground inclosed by stockade.

Nine 4-H scholarship winners from this area will join other club members from Columbia county the first of next week for the trip to Corvallis to attend the 1938 4-H summer school from June 14 to 24. Eighteen hundred Oregon 4-H club members are expected to be in attendance.

The older boys are housed in fraternity houses and the younger boys in the two men's coop-

erative houses, Reed and Heckart lodges, and the girls live in sororities and Waldo and Sackett halls. The 200 supervisors are drawn from college counselors, county extension agents and volunteer local leaders.

Friday night, June 17, the 4-H assembly will be host to the 400 Beaver State delegates in the college coliseum. Owen C. (Red) Dunning and his entertainers from KOIN, Portland, will be featured on this program. The club members will participate in a talent show during the second week and many other activities are planned to allow no dull moments.

Classes will fill a good part of each day and special emphasis this year is being given to training of junior leaders. This helps to encourage continuance of older members in club work. Ten year pins will be awarded by the First National Bank of Portland to all ten-year club members.

Marshall Featured in Western Forest Industries Review Article

An article of great local interest appeared recently in the Western Forest Industries review under the heading, "Men Among Big Trees." The feature was an interview of Larry Marshall, manager of the Dolly Varden Lumber Co. of Arcata, California, who is also president of the Redwood Region Logging conference.

Larry, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dave Marshall of Vernonia, replied to the question as to how he happened to get into the lumber business by saying, "I was born into it." When he was born in 1913 his father was a lumberman in Carson, La., in the pine lands of the south. In 1923, his father came to Vernonia and has been with the Oregon-American and Long-Bell companies

here ever since. Larry began working for the Oregon-American company summers in 1930 and worked for them off and on until 1938. He also worked for the old Clark and Wilson Lumber Co.

He is a graduate in forestry of Oregon State college where he was a member of the Phi Kappa Phi scholastic society and during his senior year in 1941, won the Lipman Wolfe award given to the senior, junior or sophomore man or woman with the highest standing.

Following his graduation he worked for the Eastern Lane Fire Patrol Ass'n. at Eugene, and the West Coast Lumberman's Ass'n. also Eugene, before joining the West Gate Lumber Co. at Sweet Home in 1946. From there he went to Arcata in 1950.

Band to Play Again Sun.

If traffic has been halted this week by the Vernonia high school band, citizens can all chalk it up to helping do their bit for the Portland Rose Festival. Bill Johnson began intensive marching practice with the band Monday evening in preparation for their participation in the grand floral parade Saturday morning. The band will be at the Multnomah stadium at 8:00 a.m. and the parade will begin to move out of the stadium at 9:30. Line of march was given in the Northwest section of Sunday's Oregonian for those who wish to choose vantage points for viewing it.

The band has also accepted an invitation from the Junior Rose Festival committee to participate Sunday in the rose planting ceremony at Peninsula park. This will take place at 1:30 p.m. and the band has been asked to play the professional, national anthem, some special numbers during the ceremony and the recessional.

Death came suddenly Monday to Mrs. Frank (Anice) Roberson of Vernonia who had gone to Portland to attend the Rose Festival festivities and suffered a fatal heart attack there.

Mrs. Roberson was the widow of Frank Roberson who passed away here in 1942. Following his death she returned to her former home in Louisiana and lived there for a number of years before returning here about two years ago to make her home with her sister, Mrs. L. H. Roberson.

Mrs. Roberson was a member of the Baptist church in Texas and was very active in the work of the Baptist church here. She also was a member of an Eastern Star chapter in Louisiana. She also was an accomplished musician and taught music in the schools in the south for many years.

Remains were forwarded Tuesday to Ruston, La. by the Colonial Mortuary in Portland for services and burial beside her husband.

Surviving besides Mrs. L. H. Roberson are two other sisters, Mrs. Yancy Robinson in Louisiana and Mrs. C. F. McCarthy in Texas and one brother, Tillman Hardy, also in Texas.

Funeral services will be Friday afternoon at 2:30 at the A. J. Rose Funeral Home in Portland. Interment will be in Lincoln Memorial cemetery.

Beef Barbecue at Moran Farm to Feature Second Day of Cattle Tour

A beef barbecue on the J. C. Moran ranch, Vernonia, will be a feature of the second day of a three-day tour of shorthorn cattle ranches June 16 through 18.

The tour, starting at the Tower Askerlund farm, Leaburg, on Thursday, June 16 at 11 a.m. will include ranches in the Willamette valley from east of Eugene to the Vernonia area in northwestern Oregon and conclude with visits to operations around Kelso, Castle Rock, Winlock and Oakville, Washington. Stops will also be made the first day at Cheshire, Oregon State college and overnight at Salem.

As the caravan moves through various counties, extension agents will outline livestock programs, highlighting pasture improvement with emphasis on fertilizer and production techniques. Examples can be observed of the change from dairy to beef cattle production that has taken place

Election to Pick Three As Directors

District 47 Meeting Scheduled June 20; Grounds Get Attention

Voters of school district 47 J. are reminded of the school election to be held Monday, June 23, at which three directors must be elected, one to fill the expired term of Sam Hearing Sr. and two to fill out the requirements of a five-man board as specified by the new law now in effect. Sam Hearing Sr. has filed a petition to place his name on the ballot for re-election and Loel Roberts and Wilbur Davis have filed for the other two positions.

PETITIONS AVAILABLE

Anyone else who wishes his name placed on the ballot may secure a blank petition from H. M. Aldrich, school clerk, or the school office. Such petitions must be signed by at least 10 legal voters and must be filed with Aldrich seven days prior to the election, or by Monday, June 13, in order to have the name placed on the ballot. Names not printed on the ballot may be written in at the time of the election.

COURTS PLANNED
