Mrs. Lincoln, who is probably one of the most maligned of famous women in our history, was really a warmly sympathetic person. The author's tears aside the myth built up around Mrs. Lincoln and presents facts proving that instead of being a cross for Mr. Lincoln to bear, she was a wife and mother who possessed, and fully earned, the love and admiration of her husband. Mrs. Randall, wife of J. G. Randall, our foremost Lincoln scholar and author of "Lincoln—The President", was present at the opening of the Lincoln papers in 1947. In addition to consulting this original evidence, she made full use of the Herndon-Weik Papers, the notes which were the basis for Herndon's biography. Mrs. Randall also had access to little-known manuscript collections and to private safe-deposit boxes which yielded letters never before used. Safeway Stores To Continue 4-H Scholarship Awards Plan

Announcement was made recently that the Safeway Stores, Inc., will continue for 1957, their sponsorship of three important phases of the Oregon 4-H club program. The agricultural enterprise is a livestock breeding program in which the state winner receives a \$100 college scholarship. Each county winner receives a summer school scholarship to the annual 4-H Club summer school in Corvallis. The full amount of the summer school scholarship is \$25. The purpose of the livestock breeding program is to encourage the development of boys and girls by promoting their participation in 4-H livestock breeding projects and by encouraging them to continue their 4-H work and improve and enlarge their herds and flocks.

The two home economics programs sponsored again in 1957 are the awards for the dollar dinner competition at the Oregon state fair and the food preparation or food preservation demonstration program in the counties and also at the State Fair.

In the dollar dinner program the champion senior dollar dinner cook receives a \$100 college scholarship from Safeway.

In the food preparation and/or food preservation contest the best demonstrator in each county will receive a \$5 cash award. At the state fair in the state competition the champion demonstrator or demonstrators in the food preparation or food preservation program each receives a \$50 U.S.
