Road Paving Machine Purchased By Columbia County

A complete motor driven mixing and paving machine, part of a long range road building program for the county, arrived in St. Helens recently. The equipment was purchased at a cost of

According to County Judge John W. Whipple, it is the hope of the court to give better roads

to the citizens of the county. "With this new equipment we expect during its lifetime to reseal and in many instances completely re-pave most of the 226 miles of worn out pavement we have and in addition to this long range paving program we hope to pay greater attention to proper roed drainage," the judge said.

However, he added that the funds available for the 1957-58 fiscal year will only permit a limited amount of paving in each of the six road districts this year

The new machine will be under the direction of Henry Lucker who will be in charge and operate it. Lucker, along with Louis Wasser and Ray Johnston, county ers, returned recently from Grants Pass where they studied both the machine's operation as well as roads built by it over recent years.
