## AROUND THE FARM BY DON COIN WALROD County Extension Agent

Fruit tree troubles of many kinds have been evident all spring and are still showing up. Not always are the problems over fruit trees, however, as ornamentals are often involved, too.

Some of these troubles are results of winter injury occurring during the November 1955 freeze. Additional damage was done by the low temperatures of January 1957. Damage of this type will continue to become evident for some time to come.

Insects, fungus diseases, and bacterial diseases are taking their toll, too. Willows are showing a leaf and twig blight that is controlled only by fall sprays of Bordeaux or copper, aphids have been extremely numerous on some of the weeping birch and the golden chain, and ambrosia beetle started working sweet cherries in earnest.

Bacterial gummosis of cherries is quite common and begins to cause the orchardist or homeowner concern when the tree shows evidence of dying. Unfortunately, we have no control for this condition other than to replace the tree. When doing so we suggest that the replacement be one that was budded high on a Mazzard rootstock, as such trees show considerable resistance to this disease. All nurserymen may not have such trees on hand, but they would provide them if orders were placed in advance so that they would have time to bud them the season ahead.

All folks who are on the mailing list to receive copies of "Oregon's Agricultural Progress", the quarterly magazine publication of the experiment station of Oregon State college, will find a postal card included with the July issue. If they wish to continue to receive this magazine it is necessary that they complete the card and return it. The publication people at OSC indicate that this is the only way they have of bringing their mailing list up to date.

Oregon's Agricultural Progress has been a very popular little magazine among those receiving it. This 16-page two-color publication reports on the results of research in homemaking. It is free to Oregon residents and our office will gladly see that a "subscription" is entered for anyone requesting it.

Spray recommendations from our office generally call for the use of a wetting agent or a sticking agent to be added to the spray mixture, in spraying for weeds and in protecting crops from diseases and insects. In visiting with some of the local dealers regarding the sale of these materials, we are inclined to believe that these wetting agents and sticking agents are often omitted.

Although today's weed killers are highly effective, they occasionally fail to kill weeds as they should. Among the reasons is the plant's failure to take up enough chemical. This is largely because the spray fails to wet the plant properly, according to Virgil Freed, OSC agricultural chemist.

Water alone is a poor material with which to wet plants because a waxy material called a cuticle covers the leaves and other parts. On young plants, a cuticle is thin and easily penetrated, but as the plant grows older, the cuticle becomes thicker, more difficult to penetrate with herbicides.

When wetting agents are added to a spray mixture, they bring about a contact between the weed killing chemical and the plant. Film formed from such a spray not only makes it easier for the herbicide to penetrate the plant, but more herbicide is deposited on and gets into the plant.

While the wetting agents increase the effectiveness of the weed killers, they lower the selectivity of these materials and can make injury to the desirable crop possible. Thus wetting agents should not be used indiscriminately, but are really worthwhile when recommended.

That the addition of wetting agents can increase the effectiveness of herbicide and reduce their selectivity was demonstrated
