kinds have been evident all spring and are still showing up. Not always are the problems over fruit trees, however, as ornamentals are often involved, too.

Some of these troubles are results of winter injury occuring during the November 1955 freeze. Additional damage was done by the low temperatures of January 1957. Damage of this type will continue to become evident for some time to come.

Insects, fungus diseases, and bacterial diseases are taking their toll, too. Willows are showing a leaf and twig blight that is controlled only by fall sprays of Bordeaux or copper, aphids have been extremely numerous on some of the weeping birch and the golden chain, and ambrosia beetle started working sweet cherries in earnest.

Bacterial gummosis of cherries is quite common and begins to cause the orchardist or homeowner concern when the tree shows evidence of dying. Unfortunately, we have no control for this condition other than to replace the tree. When doing so we suggest that the replacement be one that was budded high on a Mazzard rootstock, as such trees show considerable resistance to this disease. All nurserymen may not have such trees on hand, but they would provide them if orders were placed in advance so that they would have time to bud them the season ahead.

Fruit tree troubles of many ed a short time ago when we put out some weed control plots in flax fields of George Poysky, Clatskanie. When using the same materials and the same rates but adding a wetting agent, the kill on the weeds was improved, but at the same time the injury to the flax was increased.

> With warm weather coming up, it is a good idea to check the availability of water for poults and chickens. Water plays a vital part in a bird's welfare, so extra water during warm weather is advisable. Poultry generally consume twice as much water as feed, and their drinking habits are different from large animals. Birds drink in smaller amounts but more frequently. A "V" trough should have more than just a trickle during warm spells. Otherwise the birds may not get enough water.
