### Cattlemen's Registration Extended To January 21

The registration deadline for Oregon cattlemen wanting to vote in the forthcoming beef commission referendum has been extended to January 21 by the state department of agriculture, indicates County Extension Agent Don Coin Walrod.

All beef producers, including dairymen, are eligible to register for the voting regardless of the number of cattle owned. Cattlemen wishing to vote can register at offices of County Extension

To date owners of about 15 per cent of the cattle of Columbia county have registered, indicates Walrod.

Many farm operators have al-, and the wages paid each emready indicated they expect to ployee who was paid \$150 or more in cash or hired for 20 or more days on time basis during 1957. Along with this information, he will forward his check or money order for 41/2 per cent of the wages shown on the return. This 41/2 per cent represents the 254 per cent that he has previously withheld from his employees and the 214 per cent that he con-

tributes haself. Coverage for farm workers is based on annual earnings, Peebles. continued. It is necessary for the farm operator to keep a record of the earnings of such employees. No elaborate bookkeeping system is necessary, Peebles pointed out; but the farm operator should keep a record of the name, the social security number, the payments to the employee of cash wages for agricultural work and the amount of the employee tax deducted.

Newly covered farm workers will need social security cards. Workers can secure these cards from the local social security office, Peebles said. A worker who has had a social security number issued him at any time since 1936 should apply for a duplicate if he has lost his original card.

Peebles suggested that any farm operator who has not already done so should contact the district director of internal revenue, Portland, or his local social security office in order to be sure of getting needed information.
