### Farmers Must File SS Reports For Hands Earning \$150 or More

Many farm operators have already indicated they expect to pay one or more hired hands at least \$150 in cash wages or employ them for 20 or more days on a time basis, during 1957. James E. Peebles, district manager of the social security administration, Portland announced today.

Employer identification numbers for these farmers have been assigned, and they have been put on the mailing list to receive social security tax return forms for their employees about January 1. This means that the farm employer, who has such employees, is withholding 2 1/2 percent social security tax from the cash wages he is paying his employees. During the month of January, 1958, he will complete the tax return form, showing the name, the social security number,

and the wages paid each employee who was paid \$150 or more in cash or hired for 20 or more days on time basis during 1957. Along with this information, he will forward his check or money order for 4 1/2 per cent of the wages shown on the return. This 4 1/2 per cent represents the 2 1/2 per cent that he has previously withheld from his employees and the 2 1/2 per cent that he contributes himself.

Coverage for farm workers is based on annual earnings, Peebles continued. It is necessary for the farm operator to keep a record of the earnings of such employees. No elaborate book-keeping system is necessary, Peebles pointed out; but the farm operator should keep a record of the name, the social security number, the payments to the employee of cash wages for agricultural work and the amount of the employee's tax deducted.

Newly covered farm workers will need social security cards. Workers can secure these cards from the local social security office, Peebles said. A worker who has had a social security number issued him at any time since 1936 should apply for a duplicate if he has lost his original card.

Peebles suggested that any farm operator who has not already done so should contact the district director of internal revenue, Portland, or his local social security office in order to be sure of getting needed information.
