Dates Changed For 4-H School

Four-H club summer school dates just released from the state 4-H club office indicate a change from dates released earlier this year.

The corrected dates are June 16-22, four days shorter than it has been in the past. It was announced that the cost of operations prompted the change and shortening of the summer school session was decided instead of raising the cost of scholarships.

All 4-H club members interested in receiving scholarships must submit their applications to the 4-H club office in St. Helens by March 28. Applications this year will be the form, "My Permanent 4-H Club Record", accompanied by the club member's story on "Why I Would Like To Attend 4-H Summer School." A 4-H member to be eligible must have completed a 4-H project last year, be re-enrolled in 4-H this year, and be 12 years old by January 1, 1958.

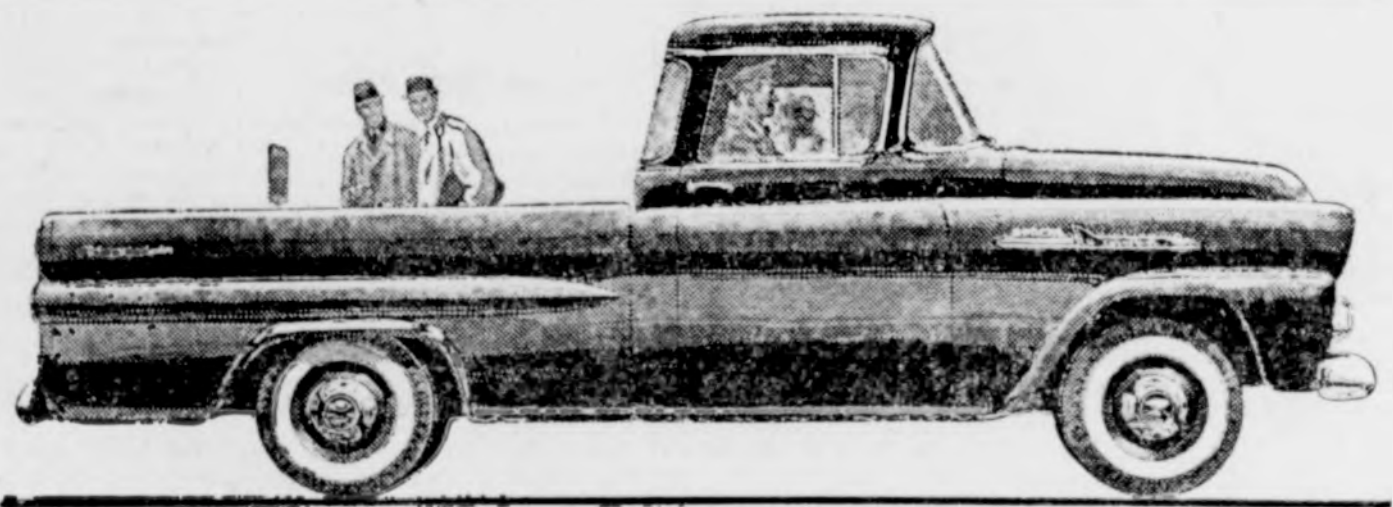
