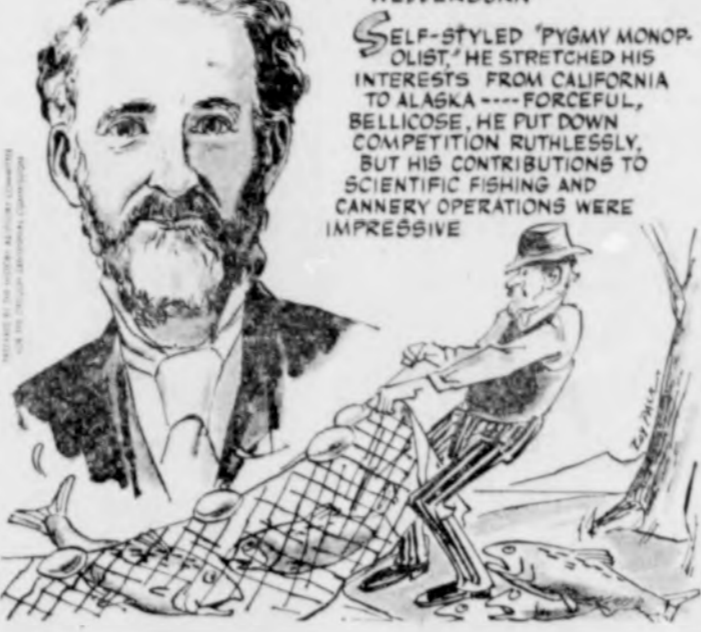

Vernonia was winner in an exciting dual track meet held here Thursday, May 7, with a score of 64-58. Vernonia was host to the Clatskanie team.

Bill Howard won the javelin with a throw of 161 feet 5 inches which broke his own record of 159 feet.

Byron Hawkins was a triple winner placing first in the 220 yard dash, broad jump, high jump and also was on the winning relay team.

Bill Howard was a double winner placing first in the shot put and javelin.
