

# 1958 Fire Toll In Oregon High

Figures from the state fire marshal's annual report show that \$12,756,560 worth of property went up in smoke in Oregon during 1958. This figure is based on insured property. Non-insured property would make the figure even larger.

In addition to the loss of property and of even more concern to us is the death caused by fire. Fifty-two Oregonian's were killed in fires last year. The principal causes of these deaths were careless smoking, nine deaths; heating appliances, 7; gasoline, kerosene, solvent, etc., 6; electricity, 5. Thirty-eight of these 52 deaths occurred in residential fires and 5 others in clothing fires.

What were some of the main causes for these fires? Careless smoking and matches, accounted for 37 per cent of the 11,228 cases; oil, grease, tar, etc., 20 per cent; hot metals including electrical devices, 17 per cent; over heated or defective stoves, furnaces, chimneys or flues, 12 per cent.
