Paul Gupta To Be Here July 19

On Tuesday, July 18 at 7:30 p.m. Rev. Paul Gupta, a converted high caste Hindu will speak at the Vernonia Bible church.

After his conversion in 1936, Rev. Gupta came to American where he received his theological education. He then returned to India and established the Hindustan Bible Institute in Madras, India where young people are trained to reach their own people with the gospel.

Rev. Gupta will have an interesting message about the work and will show colored slides of the work and India as a whole. Everyone is invited to share this privilege of seeing and hearing a Hindu who has been won to Christ.

Gupta has been in Vernonia several times previously, so is well known here.

Zooliner Offers Moonlight Rides

Portland Zoo visitors can now climb aboard the famed Zooliner train at either the Washington park or the regular Zoo terminal for a moonlight ride, Zoo Railway President Jack Jones announces.

"Moonlight rides," which are scheduled at 7:30, 8:15, 9 and 9:45 p.m. daily, include the round-trip between the Zoo and Washington park and the "Zoo Loop" tour. The nighttime trips are 75 cents for those over 16; 45 cents for children six to 16; and free to children under six.

Jimmy Rodgers, famous young singing star and Zoo fan who appeared last year in a series of Zoo Railway benefit dances, purchased the first ticket to be sold at the Washington park terminal in dedication ceremonies last Friday. Also present at the dedication were Commissioner of Parks Ormond Bean; Jones; Ed Miller, Portland Zoological Society trustee and chairman of its railway committee; and Dick Newton, a member of the Zoological Society board and vice chairman of the Zoo commission.

A lighting and a telephone system has been installed at the Washington park terminal in preparation for its use as a "moonlight ride" loading point, Zoo Railway officials said. They emphasized, however, that persons riding the Zoo train during daylight hours will be able to board the train only at the regular Zoo terminal.

Travel Shows Steady Gain

Street and highway travel in Oregon so far this year is showing a steady increase with more than 3 billion miles traveled during the first five months of the year, the Department of Motor Vehicles has reported.

This exceeds travel last year for the same period by better than 191 million miles and the comparable 1959 period by more than 257 million miles.

At the same time, the department said the state's mileage death rate based on the number of persons killed in each 100 million miles traveled, is up from last year's 4.6 to 5.4 for the January through May period.

For five months at least, the death rate is lower than for 1959 when a record traffic toll was set, but all that may be changed, the department said, when the 6-month death rate is computed.

June this year saw an all-time high death toll of 55 recorded for that month. Unless mileage saw a correspondingly sharp increase, it will in all likelihood shove the death rate above 1959, too.

The department computes mileage based on reports of gasoline gallonage sold each month.

There were 1,140 accidental deaths in Oregon in 1960.

4-H Foresters Schedule Camp

The District 4-H Forestry camp will be held at Camp Wilkerson on July 17, 18 and 19. Four-H club members from nine counties in Northwestern Oregon will be taking part in this three day camp.

Club members will arrive at 11 a.m. Monday, July 17. Following an organization meeting and lunch, the camp will be officially underway.

Classes will start at 1 p.m. on Monday and will run until noon Wednesday. Instructors from Oregon State University, commercial firms and volunteer leaders will teach the group various phases of forestry, wild life and outdoor living. An attendance of approximately 125 is expected.
